TIPS

- Sunscreen: Please try to use <u>reef safe sun screen</u>! It is so much better for marine life/ocean and better for you too!
- Gifts/souvenirs:
 - Walmart (It is much more Hawaiian themed than the mainland; macadamia nuts/chocolates, coffee, candies, décor, clothes are all there)
 - Target (clothing has some Hawaiian theme, TONS more bathing suits)
 - ABC Stores (they are everywhere, most of the things you find there is at Walmart for cheaper but it is the classic Hawaii gift/souvenir shop!
 - Want to buy an aloha shirt? Go to a thrift store!
- At Walmart:
 - Get water shoes for snorkeling for walking on volcanic rock at the snorkeling beach, it'll be way less slippery and prickly
 - Snorkeling gear/boogie boards/bamboo mats are cheap too, but sometimes where you are staying will have them available
- Rush hour can get bad with one lane highways, map out/plan where you want to go ahead of time
- Parking in Downtown Kona:
 - Morning/afternoon: park in the farmers parking lot (it's rarely regulated) but there
 is a metered parking lot right next to it
 - Evenings: at the public library, farmers parking lot or the lot across the street where there are doctor's offices
- When you are going snorkeling, search low/high tide times
- Actual Kona coffee is expensive, but it is delicious! Go on a coffee tour to learn more about quality Kona coffee!

 - Pine Village Small Farm is specifically catered to Japanese visitors

 - A note about Kona coffee: as long as there's 10% of Kona Coffee in the roast, it's deemed as "Kona Coffee." Real Kona Coffee will be min \$30, and good descriptors to find is "Peaberry," "Extra Fancy."
 - Walmart has a Hualalai coffee brand, the peaberry one is good (~\$32), just make sure to look through the expiration date and find fresher ones

- o Kahalu'u Beach (best snorkeling) lots of turtles and beautiful fish
- Mauna Kea Beach (Connected to a resort but you can just go to the beach)
- Mau'u Mae Beach (same entrance as Mauna Kea Resort)

- o Manini'owali Beach (Kua Bay) snorkeling when it's low tide

 - Hilo Farmers Market (Wednesday & Saturday)
 - o Richardson Ocean Park great for snorkeling/swimming
 - Downtown Hilo
 - o Lyman Museum and Mission House History/culture of Hawaii, \$10 admission
 - Mehana Brewing Company
